God's transcendent sovereignty never functions to eliminate or marginalize human accountability, or to transform God's image-bearers to the status of a robot, while human accountability and responsibility never make God absolutely contingent (e.g., Gen. 50:19-20; Isa. 10:5-19; John 6:35-40, 45-46; Acts 4:27-28; Rom. 9-10; Phil. 2:12-13). That there are extremely difficult philosophical questions associated with this outlook cannot be denied, but the solution cannot be to reduce the difficulty by adopting positions that outlaw half the evidence. It will not do, for example, to argue that God cannot know the future where the future brings decisions of free individuals. Not only do I not know exactly how "future" looks to a transcendent God (though at least some of the possibilities can be listed and explored), the "free individuals" are never so free as to make God absolutely contingent. In any case, the Bible dares to speak not only of God's knowledge of the future, but even of the future of our thoughts and choices (remember Proverbs! – Prov. 16:4, 9, 33; Prov. 21:1). The Psalmist understood this: "Before a word is on my tongue you know it completely, O Lord Such knowledge is too wonderful for me, too lofty for me to attain" (Ps. 139:4-6). The Bible even assumes God has "middle knowledge," i.e., that he knows not only what is, from our perspective, past, present, and future, but also what might have been under different circumstances (Matt. 11:20-24).

1. God is absolutely sovereign, but his sovereignty never functions in such a way that human responsibility is curtailed, minimized, or mitigated.
2. Human beings are morally responsible creatures—they significantly choose, rebel, obey, believe, defy, make decisions, and so forth, and they are rightly held accountable for such actions; but this characteristic never functions so as to make God absolutely contingent.

God stands behind evil in such a way that not even evil takes place outside the bounds of his sovereignty; yet evil is not morally chargeable to him: it is always chargeable to secondary agents, to secondary causes. In other words, if I sin, I cannot possibly do so outside the bounds of God's sovereignty ..., but I alone am responsible for that sin—or perhaps I and those who tempted me, led me astray, and the like. God is not to be blamed. But if I do good, it is God working in me both to will and to act according to his good pleasure. God's grace has been manifest in my case, and he is to be praised.
